Lead Homicide Investigator

This three day, 24 hour course has been designed by the Mobile Training Unit, along with expert practitioners from the field of evidence collection and crime scene processing for the purpose of providing law enforcement officers assigned to evidence collection duties with the skills and knowledge needed for the operation of a digital SLR camera system for the photographic documentation of crime scene evidence.

This program will provide officers with the needed skills to operate their department issued camera equipment using the most up to date techniques. Topics to be addressed in this program include the following:

- Operating a SLR digital camera in manual, aperture priority, shutter priority and program modes
- Understanding how depth of field effects crime scene photography
- The three types of crime scene photographs, orientation, reference and identification.
- How to produce examination quality photographs.
- Understanding of the use of fill flash in outdoor crime scene photography
- Producing properly exposed photographs in a low light environment.
- Properly downloading images from the cameras to a storage unit.

The goals of this course are to provide attendees with a comprehensive overview of crime scene photography. Attendees will be able to will understand the basic operational functions of a SLR camera along with being able to properly document photographically a crime scene. Officers will learn to operate their cameras, in normal and low light environments along with taking examination quality photographs of evidence.

STUDENTS SHOULD BRING THEIR DEPARTMENT ISSUED CAMERA EQUIPMENT AND THE INSTRUCTION MANUAL, TO THIS COURSE. THIS SHOULD INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING:

- Camera Body
- Any additional lenses

This Course meets the following Mandates:

Emergency Medical Response Training, Procedural Justice This one day, 8 hour course is intended to provide advanced knowledge and training for the decision making process during the initial phase of critical incidents. It will identify roles and responsibilities within the command structure while operating on the incident scene.

Critical incidents involving mass shootings and active shooter situations have presented law enforcement and other public safety agencies with challenges involving command structure, communications, and coordination. The aim of this course is to increase the base knowledge amongst the responders so that they are able to act effectively and efficiently during a critical incident. By utilizing the NIMS and ICS as the backbone, it will standardize responses and increase cooperation and understanding between law enforcement agencies as well as other disciplines of public safety (fire, EMS).

In this program, students will give attendees the opportunities to implement the critical thinking and decision making from the basic class. Emphasis will be placed on expending the concepts utilized in managing incidents. They will also review the ICS structure and learn how to build out a command structure in a systematic basis to reduce confusion and build familiarity. The students will participate in practical radio drill table top exercises where they assume different roles within the ICS structure in order to gain better understanding.

The goals of this program are as follows:

- Review previous material regarding critical incident response
- Advanced view of ICS structure and the theory of building an organization
- Identify issues and difficulties faced by agencies responding to critical incidents
- Learn the concept of "Span of Control" and how it affects an ICS structure
- Importance of accountability in relation to officer safety
- Learn the importance of the use of common terminology
- The importance of establishing command, and the responsibilities associated with its role
- Training in executing incident command and build out an ICS organization
- How to identify pressing issues at a scene
- Learn how to prioritize the issues presented
- Define objectives, strategies, and tactics as related to a critical incident response
- How to determine resource needs initially, and as the incident expands
- Learn the importance of the Staging Area Manager
- Learn how to communicate effectively at the scene through practical exercises and radio drills
- Learn and understand the different roles and assignments at the scene and how they relate to the overall objective

While not a mandatory requirement, it is suggested that students enrolling in this class have completed the DECISION MAKING FOR CRITICAL INCIDENT RESPONSE course as it builds on its concepts and techniques; NIMS ICS 100 and ICS 200 courses.

Participants will demonstrate and perform the maneuvers in a controlled and efficient manner before the conclusion of the program. There will be a 4 hour classroom portion with a law review and written test. Participants should bring note taking materials for the classroom portion.

The bulk of the program will be outside on the driving track, regardless of weather. Dress appropriately for the weather conditions and bring supplies to be outside for several hours. Vehicles will be provided for the driving portion and training will be on a closed track. Vehicles will not exceed 35 to 40 miles per hour during the program. This Course meets the following Mandates: ARIDE, Civil Rights, Constitutional Use of LE Authority, Legal Updates The Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement program was developed by the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration with input from the International Association of Chiefs of Police Technical Advisory Panel and the Virginia Association of Chiefs of Police. ARIDE was created to address the gap in training between Standardized Field Sobriety Testing and Drug Evaluation and Classification Programs.

This course will offer additional information to law enforcement officers on detecting impairment caused by more than just alcohol. Often law enforcement officers who have not received advanced or in service training regarding drug impairment tend to not be able to identify these characteristics and oftentimes release impaired drivers. Once an officer completes this training, he/she will be more proficient with the 3 battery of tests (HGN, WAT, OLS), and will have a broader knowledge of drug impairment indicators. Students will also become more familiar with the DRE program and its function, thus facilitating better communication and transfer of critical roadside indicators of impairment to the evaluating DRE officer for a more complete and accurate assessment of impairment.

There are times when a student presents an incident of rage and a wanton disregard for human life by conspiring to make themselves famous through death and destruction. However, many students, school administrators and/ or LEO minimizes the comments and postings of the school shooter. We often train our youth "If you see something, say something." It is what Schools and Law Enforcement do with that information that may predict the outcome.

The reason why LEO's and School Officials continue to "brush off" the student is due to the lack of training and understanding of Social Media and Internet Investigations. This class will train the School administration and Law Enforcement on the protocols set forth in dealing with this type of school violence.

The goal of this training is to empower school administrators and Law Enforcement how to gather digital evidence against the aggressor so they may find out who the perpetrator is and take action immediately after the comment or posting is made by the aggressor. According to P.A. 90 646, waivers will be contingent upon an officer's successful completion of the written test and qualifying course of fire from the 40 Hr. Mandatory Firearms Training Program.

The written examination consists of 50 multiple choice questions. Officers seeking a waiver must achieve a passing score of 70% and will have only one opportunity to pass the written test. The Handgun Qualification Course of Fire consists of 10 rounds fired from the 5 yard line, 14 rounds fired from the 7 yard line, 14 rounds fired from the 10 yard line, and 12 rounds fired from the 15 yard line. The officer will receive only be allowed three (3) opportunities to qualify for record.

Range time will be given to familiarize officers with the official course of fire. Students will receive N.E.M.R.T. and State of Illinois certificates reflecting successful completion of the requirements of P.A. 90 646.

Departments are to submit a Form E, as well as a Waiver Application for the individual officer to the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board.

In order to have their registration confirmed, departments will then need to submit the following to NEMRT, prior to the start of the course:

Letter from ILETSB authorizing individual to participate in course of fire NEMRT's Consent to Participate Form NEMRT's Indemnification Agreement

Additionally, it is not advised that you put your contact lenses in for 24 hours following the exposure, so please plan accordingly.
- If you use an inhaler you should bring it with you. Although OC is not likely to cause an asthma attack, some people may experience a high level of anxiety which could cause them the need to use their inhaler.
- You will need your duty belt including handcuffs. NO WEAPONS will be allowed to be worn during the exposure portion of the training.
- Bring a change of clothes with you. During the decontamination process you (and your clothing) will likely become extremely wet. Keep this in mind when selecting your clothing.
- You might consider bringing toiletry items to assist in cleaning yourself up after the exposure (i.e. towel, soap, etc.)
- It is suggested that you limit (or avoid) hair products the day of training as your hair will get wet during decontamination and those products will likely cause additional irritation. The same applies for cosmetics/eye make up.
- While most people will totally recover from the effects of OC within 45 minutes, everyone reacts differently. Your safety is of the utmost importance, so we will need to monitor each person's reaction and recovery closely. Therefore, you will not be allowed to leave the training site for any reason (following the exposure) until class is over.

Disturbing national trends indicate that offenders are relying on more advanced weaponry and firepower, leaving first responders over matched and our communities increasingly vulnerable to threats to life and property. Expert practitioners from the field of law enforcement designed the tactics, techniques and procedures contained in this lesson plan.

The primary focus of SEND IT is to provide the SWAT sniper, designated marksman or a patrolman equipped with a magnified scope or electronic optic with practical live fire capabilities using a motor vehicle as an unconventional shooting platform during high risk surveillance including but not limited to; patrol operations, special investigations, security details, warrant service, hostage rescue, or barricaded gunman incidents. SEND IT starts in a classroom environment, transitions to off range surveillance exercises and culminates into a progressive time constrained live fire range exercise to speed decision making, refine mental recognition and improve accuracy. All rifles must be sighted in prior to class. Iron sighted rifles are not permitted.

SEND IT addresses the following topics;

For the patrolman:

A patrolman equipped with a magnified AR-15 optic possesses more advantages over a patrolman having a non magnified optic in the area of observation, positive identification and spotting. In addition, the patrolman equipped with a magnified optic or electronic mounted optic has enhanced capabilities over his or her iron sighted counterpart. For this reason, many police agencies have authorized the use of magnified optics and/or electronic optics and have adopted policies governing same. SEND IT will boost the patrolman's performance in non typical patrol settings and demonstrates the need for modified skill development in special circumstances that call for high risk vehicle

For the designated marksman:

A designated marksman is a force multiplier in the area of patrol operations and has seen a rise amongst police agencies across the country. SEND IT will enhance the designated marksman's effectiveness during a real world high level use of force incident and challenges the marksman to perform outside the typical constraints of AR-15 long gun handling by providing real world positional shooting techniques based on the real world environment of patrol vehicle operations. SEND IT is the next step for any previously trained designated marksman and will validate the officers' training evolution process.

For the SWAT sniper/observer:

A SWAT sniper/observer is one of the most valuable assets of any law enforcement tactical team and is tasked with critical missions to ensure SWAT commanders have accurate and up to date information. The sniper/observer must demonstrate not only proficiency in said weapons system but also the mental composure in situations that are tense, uncertain and rapidly involving. SEND IT will challenge the sniper/observer to perform at higher than expected levels and will validate their role in a tactical team environment. This course will not only enhance the sniper/observer's individual field craft capacities but the over all operational team tactics of their special unit.

The purpose of this 2 night advanced live fire law enforcement program is to identify strengths and weaknesses in use of force low light conditions when facing armed offenders in and around a motor vehicle or the urban environment. Since the majority of a patrol officer's career is spent in a vehicle working in low light conditions. Level 2 will introduce required live fire weapons handling skills for night time law enforcement patrol vehicle operations. The tactics, techniques and procedures contained in this lesson plan were designed by expert practitioners from the field of law enforcement to increase officer survival in low light environments.

The primary focus of level 2 is to provide law enforcement officers with practical low light weapons handling techniques while employing a weapon mounted or hand held flash light and identifies difficulties associated with the low light law enforcement patrol operations involving: counter ambush, self aide (as recommended by the Committee for Tactical Emergency Casualty Care), and citizen/officer rescue.

Topics to be addressed include the following:

- Understand the benefits and limitations to a dedicated weapon mounted light.



De-escalation Techniques, Law Concerning Stops, Search, Use of Force, Legal Updates, Officer Safety Techniques This program may only be attended by students who have previously completed a course of instruction similar to the State of Illinois Mandatory Firearms Training program as provided by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board. The sole authority for allowing a student to participate in this program and to waive any participant from attending the entire Mandatory Firearms Training program applicable to Illinois Peace Officers is vested in the Board.

The program consists of classroom refresher training to prepare students to take the written examination required by P.A. 90-646, actual administration of the examination, and having each student attempt to qualify on the State of Illinois-approved Mandatory Firearms Training Qualification Course. According to P.A. 90-646, waivers will be contingent upon an officer's successful completion of the written test and qualifying course of fire from the 40 Hr. Mandatory Firearms Training Program.

The written examination consists of 50 multiple choice questions. Officers seeking a waiver must achieve a passing score of 70% and will have only one opportunity to pass the written test. The Handgun Qualification Course of Fire consists of 24 rounds shot from the 7 yard line, 18 rounds shot from the 15 yard line and 8 rounds shot from the 25 yard line. All shooting begins from the secured holster position. The officer will receive only two opportunities to qualify for the record.

Range time will be given to familiarize officers with the official course of fire. Students will receive N.E.M.R.T. and State of Illinois certificates reflecting successful completion of the requirements of P.A. 90-646.

Departments are to submit a Form E, as well as a Waiver Application for the individual officer to the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board.

In order to have their registration confirmed, departments will then need to submit the following to NEMRT, prior to the start of the course:

- Letter from ILETSB authorizing individual to participate in course of fire
- NEMRT's Consent to Participate Form
- NEMRT's Indemnification Agreement

Public Act 79-652 states, "Possession and use of a firearm, in connection with official duties of a peace officer in Illinois, is conditional upon participation and successful completion of 40 Hour Firearms Training."

Your agency supervisor has scheduled you to participate in a 40 Hour Mandatory Firearms Training Program. This program satisfies the requirements of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board.

Training includes classroom instruction and weapons practice at a firing range with instructors certified by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board. The following conditions were established through the cooperative efforts of the Board and North East Multi-Regional Training, Inc. It is your responsibility to read these conditions thoroughly and adhere to all of them. These include:

- 1. Report to training as instructed by your Chief, Sheriff, or Training Officer
- 2. Safety regulations of the range, weapon conditions, and ammunition use will be directed by the Range Master and his assistants.
- 3. The Range Master will instruct and enforce strict regulations for safe handling and use of weapons at all times. Anyone who endangers the safety or well-being of others will be ejected from the premises. This includes horseplay, carelessness, or any other inappropriate behavior.
- 4. You must bring your own weapon, ammunition, and required equipment. The Range Master and his assistants will not provide, repair, or replace any equipment. Please make certain all equipment is in proper working condition.
- 5. Classroom instruction is held in the evening. You are required to bring notebooks, pens or pencils. *DO NOT BRING WEAPONS OR AMMUNITION TO CLASSROOM SESSIONS*.
- 6. Range instruction is held on Saturdays and Sundays. You are required to bring the following to the range:
 - a. Service weapon in safe firing condition
 - b. Duty holster
 - c. 550 rounds ammunition (factory or reload)
 - d. Eye and ear protection
 - e. Shotgun in safe firing condition
 - f. Appropriate clothing for outdoor range (depending on class location)
 - g. Cleaning kit for your service weapon
 - h. Bag lunch or money to purchase meal

State statute requires successful completion of this training BEFORE you can legally carry a weapon while performing law enforcement duties. Successful completion is achieved with at least a 70% on the written examination and 70% on each of the two qualification shooting rounds. Re-testing for a failed written examination or a failed range qualification will be handled in accordance with the policies of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board.

Care and use of your weapon is a serious matter. You are required to conduct yourself in a professional manner at all times during this training program.

Pre-Registration

NEMRT courses are filled on a first-come, first-serve basis, based upon the Pre-Registration forms we receive. Typically, our courses quickly fill to capacity. Once a class has reached its capacity of students, "Stand-By" lists are created.

Students on stand-by lists may not attend our programs. All students must first be confirmed by our Registrar's office. After receiving confirmation, students may attend the training program, where they complete an actual registration form. Confirmation and stand-by lists are distributed weekly by the Registrar.

Please keep in mind that courses fill quickly. Pre-register your students early!

Attendance Policy

The Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board (ILETSB) requires that all attendees of a course for which they will receive a certificate from the Board be present for 90% of the course. For example, one must be present for 36 hours of an ILETSB-certified 40 hour course. NEMRT has adopted that policy for all of its training programs, allowing attendees to miss no more than 10% of any course, with a legitimate excuse (family emergency, need to appear in court, reassignment, etc.) and still receive a NEMRT certificate.

Cancellations

When we receive a cancellation, students are moved from the stand-by list to fill the vacancy. We then notify your training officer that the student has been moved from stand-by and confirmed to attend the program.

Occasionally, training officers fail to notify us that an officer will be unable to attend. When this occurs, students on the stand-by list are denied an opportunity to attend the training they need.

To avoid this situation, please contact the Registrar's Office as soon as possible regarding schedule conflicts and cancellations. With this information, we are able to move officers from stand-by lists and into course rosters. This increases both the number of officers receiving training and the overall effectiveness of your training dollars.

Please note in the *Course Description* section the statements about cancellation deadlines and billing for each class. Usually, the deadline is 7 days prior to the start of the course unless otherwise noted.

Basic Part-Time Law Enforcement Officer Training

In accordance with Public Act 89-170, all part-time sworn police officers in the state of Illinois are required to successfully complete a Basic Part-Time Law Enforcement Officer Training Course. North East Multi-Regional Training, Inc. is offering a choice of two different basic training academies to fulfill the requirements of this act. *The tuition shown below for each of these academies is eligible for reimbursement through the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board*.

Web Based Academy

Through the efforts of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board, the ILETSB Executive Institute, and the Center for Applied Internet Technology (CAIT) at Western Illinois University, the STTAR program has been redeveloped and updated to deliver part-time basic training in a cutting-edge distance learning format using the internet.

Approximately 212 hours of instruction are delivered via the internet, allowing students to choose the times most convenient for them to independently complete an average of seven hours of training per week through the internet. This training is supplemented with eight-hour classroom sessions conducted on Saturdays, where the students receive lectures from instructors who are experts on the subject matter, and to participate in performance-based practical exercises.

This program, with the addition of the 40 Hour Mandatory Firearms Training course, meets the 560-hour curriculum for law enforcement basic training. In total, the program takes approximately 9 months to complete.

Scheduling of the next WEB Academy is awaiting development/approval of a new Basic Academy curriculum by the ILETSB.

Tuition: \$1,100.00

Due to substantial changes being made to the academy curriculum by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board, we cannot set a date for our next offering of the Web-Based Academy.

Students are required to successfully complete the P.O.W.E.R. test to enroll in the Web Based Academy. NEMRT offers the P.O.W.E.R. test prior to the orientation for each program. There is a \$35.00 fee to take the test. No POWER tests are currently scheduled.. All POWER testing will be conducted at the Crestwood Wellness and Recreation Center in Crestwood, IL.

The 40 Hour Mandatory Firearms course is not included in the Web Based Academy. Therefore, we have arranged a special firearms course reserved for those part-time officers enrolling in the academy who have not yet been certified. Tuition for the course is the standard in-service **tuition of \$175.00**. Please indicate on the pre-registration form those officers who are enrolling in both the academy and the firearms course. The dates for this course will be announced.

THE ASSIST PROGRAM

The Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board administers the Intergovernmental Law Enforcement Officers In-Service Training Act (P.A. 82-674). This Act, coupled with the Traffic Surcharge and Criminal Conviction fund, provides the structure and financial support for a unique state\local partnership. This partnership provides decentralized delivery of in-service training within commuting distance of virtually every law enforcement and corrections officer in the state.

On Jan. 1, 1983, The Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board launched A Statewide System of In-Service Training, known as the ASSIST Program. Within five years, the Mobile Team Unit conducted over 7,000 courses for over 120,000 in-service practitioners. The ASSIST Program has since gained national recognition as one of the most cost-effective and comprehensive inservice training systems in the United States.

The objectives of the program are:

- O To encourage local law enforcement and corrections officers to upgrade their knowledge, skills, and techniques pertinent to the law enforcement profession
- O To provide local law enforcement officers with training opportunities within their own locales and on flexible schedules
- O To provide quality training on topics of instruction centered on specific training needs

NEMRT MEMBERSHIP



Annual membership in North East Multi-Regional Training will be \$95.00 per full-time officer. In addition to payment for all full-time officers, members may select from three payment options to tailor training for their civilian, reserve, part-time, and auxiliary officers:

- 1. You may pay for all full-time, part-time, reserve and auxiliary officers, and civilians within your total membership at \$95.00 per individual.
- 2. You may pay for all full-time officers and only a specified number of your total civilian, reserve, part-time, and auxiliary officers. The number chosen is entirely up to you.
- 3. You may pay for full-time officers only and pay non-member tuition fees for those classes attended by your civilian, reserve, part-time, and auxiliary officers.

As an added benefit, members employing more than 125 full-time officers need only pay for the first 125 officers. This maximum membership fee of \$11,875.00 entitles all full-time officers, not merely the first 125, to unlimited training through North East Multi-Regional Training for the membership year. Membership fees would still need to be paid for any part-time, reserve, or civilian employees you wish to include.

Occasionally, courses are offered that require tuition from member and non-member departments alike. These fees arise from the special equipment that may accompany the course, or from the expense arising from bringing in an out-of-state expert for timely courses of a technical nature. However, member department tuition fees are typically lower than a non-members.

MEMBERSHIP CATEGORIES

NEMRT's voting membership consists of municipal and county law enforcement agencies whose units of government have voluntarily signed an Intergovernmental Agreement, or have passed a Resolution and Adoption of existing Intergovernmental Agreements, which establishes "NEMRT, INC." as a mobile team in-service training unit. Member departments are invited to the Annual Election of Directors, held on the third Tuesday of March, to cast their votes.

Member department Intergovernmental Agreements are self-renewing and do not require annual processing unless membership is dropped for more than one year. Then the Agreements will be addressed as a new membership again.

Non-voting member departments are federal and state law enforcement agencies who are eligible to participate in regional law enforcement in-service training under the Illinois Intergovernmental Law Enforcement Officers In-Service Training Act, but are precluded from signing an Intergovernmental Agreement due to the structure of their governing rules. In such cases, department administrators may contract with NEMRT, Inc./Mobile Team Unit #3, to allow their law enforcement personnel to participate in the Region's in-service training efforts at an annual rate established by the NEMRT, Inc. Advisory Board. Non-voting member departments are precluded from serving on the Board of Directors or voting on matters that affect NEMRT, Inc./Mobile Team Unit #3 operations, policies, and/or procedures.

Non-member departments are federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies that decline formal membership in the ASSIST Program. They remain eligible to participate and attend in-service training under the In-Service Training Act, but are required to pay tuition as listed in the course descriptions. Non-member agencies are billed for attendance after the completion of each course.
